Rural societies in Africa have undergone some great changes since the start of the 1980s, with the influence of globalization, structural adjustment policies, poverty reduction strategies, the introduction of multi-party political systems, and decentralization of political power. In these lectures, we will look mainly at texts published in recent years that treat the short- and long-term social and economic transformations experienced by African rural societies, and discuss their concerns and their methods of analysis.

[Course Goals]

To acquire the basic knowledge of the fieldwork in the developing countries including African rural societies.

[Course Schedule and Contents]

The format of the class will be as follows: each student will be assigned one of the readings (books published in Japanese, in principle), and will be required to present a summary of the contents with comments, after which we will have a question-and answer session, with further explanation provided. The texts we will read will be decided in consultation with the students attending the class at the orientation meeting.

Wildlife conservation is an important global issue since it concerns the preservation of biodiversity in a whole variety of ecosystems all over the world. On the other hand, for the people who live in the habitats of the endangered animals, wildlife conservation is "their own" problem highly specific to the region, and based on a particular local history and their way of thinking towards animals. In this class we will take a fresh look at wildlife conservation as one contemporary problem in which global and local concerns intersect. Students will gain an understanding of the relevant basic concepts through a range of readings and class discussion.

[Course Goals]

Students are expected to acquire basic knowledge about keywords which are taken up at the class, to use such keywords in active discussions at the class, in anticipation of eventually activate ideas obtained through such discussions during field researches.

[Course Schedule and Contents]

Class schedule and contents will be decided in consultation with students at the first meeting. The tentative curriculum is as follows:

Week 1:

Explanation of the direction of the class.

Weeks 2-7:

In these weeks, We will discuss and understand diverse approaches to nature conservation, using specific examples. Main discussion points: "Who" is protecting "what kind" of nature, by "which methods," and for "what purposes"? Debates on preservation v.s. conservation, the rights and wrongs of artificial intervention.

Weeks 8-10:

In these weeks, we will look at the debates on environmental conservation, and try to deepen the understanding by putting the debates in broader contexts of Area Studies. Main discussion points: The Antipoverty (hottokenai) campaign, participatory development debates, humanitarian intervention.

Weeks 11-15:

In these weeks we will choose certain keywords, depending on the interests of students in the class, and have discussions on the specific sets of problems.

Keyword examples:

Biodiversity, environmental sustainability, the problem of invasive alien species, "resilience," ecological philosophy, the "Should Trees Have Standing" debate, the Animal Rights debate, citizens' rights movements and nature conservation philosophy, animal welfare and empathy, alpinism and adventure, the concepts of 'scenery' and 'landscape', the birth and history of landscape pictures, "nature writing" and "correspondence"

Using multi-disciplinary research data I have collected, this course discusses the entwined relationships between human activities and the environment with special emphasis on the exchange of various natural and social resources among people in contemporary African societies. Each year, I will select a theme pertaining to this subject and develop empirical and theoretical arguments together with the course participants. In the 2019 course, we will reconsider hunter-gatherer childhood with setting "play" as the key concept, based on both the lecturer 's field research on several groups of San and the literature review of the relevant studies of the wider hunter-gatherer groups.
