This class employs interdisciplinary perspectives with an area studies approach; deals with issues concerning health risks with particular focus on ethical problems involved or consensus building.

Infectious diseases respect no geographical border, and have been recognized as threats to the global societies. The global burden imposed by life-style diseases is also significant. The Part I (seven sessions) employs interdisciplinary perspectives with an area studies approach; deals with case studies, focusing on several Asian countries. Objectives include: 1) to identify public health risks imposed by infectious diseases (including the ones that follow disasters) and other diseases, 2) to understand social, economic and political elements of the risks, 3) to discuss/plan countermeasures and ways to create social and political consensus as a leader in dealing with public health risks in society.

The Part II concerns how certain public health interventions are affected by diverse values and beliefs of people in different parts of the world. We will discuss the relevance of HIV and other health interventions by comparing the perspectives of different stakeholders including policy makers, experts, community members, and patients.

Lecturers for both parts will guide non-native English speakers to become more comfortable to express opinion in English to participate actively in the classroom discussion.

#### [Course Goals]

Part I (Dr. Yoshikawa, 7 sessions)

- 1. To become knowledgeable of public health risks in today 's societies to discuss the global challenges.
- 2. To improve one 's ability to analyze a variety of factors pertaining to infectious and other diseases, such as medical, social, economic, and political issues to evaluate intervention tools to mitigate risks in societies.

Part II (Dr. Nishi, 7 sessions)

- 1. To understand how different perspectives / interests of stakeholders would affect planning and implementation of health interventions.
- 2. To reflect on institutional and ethical problems involved in the research project of each student.

This course focuses on a wide range of literatures on comparative politics. In keeping with the spirit of comparative political science, most lectures involve a key paired comparison of two countries. We will also demonstrate how paired comparisons are changeable, given the types of questions one is pursuing. We will concentrate on six countries in Southeast Asia: Indonesia, the Philippines, Malaysia, Vietnam, Thailand and Burma. To fulfill the purpose of this course, we will discuss key themes from a comparative perspective, including the study of institutions, state formation and state-society relations, types of regime, political culture, political economy, and resistance and revolution.

#### [Course Goals]

To encouage students to think beyond the normative understanding of "Southeast Asia" and look into critical contemporary issues facing the region--issues that had their historical origin. Also, to expect student's active participation in class discussion, from the students' viewpoint that may challenge and contest the normative understanding of this region.

- d. The significance of the book(s) to Southeast Asian studies and to comparative politics

Your essays should examine the themes more in depth than the readings allow. They should be comparative in scope; that is, compare and contrast between two countries.
