The objective of the lecture is twofold. In the first half of it a few examples of intergated research of natural and social sciences/humanities will be presented. One example is the water-food-energy nexus in India and Bangladesh and another example is the natural rubber industry from production to processing and marketing in Thailand and Myanmar. In the latter half of the lecture how to estimate production cost of agricultural produce in the process of fieldwork is presented. Through examining production cost estimation method in various parts of Asia, it is expected to understand the differences between East, Southeast, and South Asia.

It is not so easy in fact to master how to do integrated research of natural and social sciences/humanities but the lecture will provide the opportunities to try to do it through a few concrete examples. The personalities of areas can be obtained through such integrated research of natural and social sciences/humanities in each area. Area studies should submit each area's personalities by comparing more than two areas. The lecture's ultimate purpose is to achieve it by the two steps above mentioned.

UNHCR's annual Global Trends Report, released on June 19th, 2018 (https://www.unhcr.org/ph/figures-at-aglance), shows that 68.5 million people around the world were forcibly displaced at the end of 2017. Thoughout that year, 16.2 million people were newly displaced, meaning 31 people were newly displaced every minute of the day. Of all these 68.5 million, 52% were children. In part because of the fate of a Syrian toddler who drowned crossing the Mediterranean in September 2015 - Aylan Kurdi - together with continuous waves of refugees crossing the Mediterranean, media coverage has been mainly focusing on the Syrian dimension of this crisis. But those 35 million plus young persons have been from all over the world: Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Burma/Myanmar, El Salvador, Eritrea, Honduras, Iraq, Libya, and Nigeria, among others.

In light of such crises, two basic questions will guide this course's trajectory. First, what are the basic forms of power relations embedded in the refugeehood? Second, what has gone wrong with the refugee regime? In answering these questions, the course employs transdisciplinary approaches from political science, philosophy, anthropology, cultural studies, and sustainable humanosphere studies.

The course comprises four parts. First, it will start with Melissa Fleming's powerful book - A Hope More Powerful Than the Sea: One Refugee's Incredible Story of Love, Loss, and Survival (2017) - hoping to stimulate students to raise questions (whether conceptual or not, theoretical or otherwise) that will guide our journey thoughout the semester. Second, there will be a few lecture sessions by the instructors to lay down some key philosophical, theoretical and conceptual bases for the course. Third, students will lead class discussion based on the rest of the required readings. Fourth, there will be students' presentations of their term papers' proposals.

[Course Goals]

The main aim of this course is to develop a set of basic - yet, at times, deep - understanding on the complexities and dynamics of forced migration on global, regional and national scales, with special attention to some contexts of war and/or persecution.

[Course Schedule and Contents]

Pedagogically, the course will be conducted in both lecture and seminar formats, whereby students are expected to have been prepared to discuss the reading(s) assigned for each session. During the third part of the course, i.e., students leading class discussion, the following is the detailed procedure:

The discussion of such reading(s) will be led by about 1-2 persons, depending on class enrollment. The leader(s) will prepare a PPT/Keynote. Within each PPT/Keynote, they will have to fulfill the following requirements:

The Study of Islamic Thought provides the disciplinary foundations for studying the Islamic world. In addition to mastering the fundamentals of Islamic studies, students will aim to acquire the ability to express themselves and share information about basic questions in this field. In addition to discussing the basic questions connected with each topic, they will conduct debates based on current academic knowledge and research, but since this is a graduate course, it will not deal with introductory topics.

[Course Goals]

The objective of this lecture is to know and understand the basics of Islamic thought. Because Islamic studies have been based on Arabic language, it is most important to know how to express the basic notions and technical terms in Arabic.

[Course Schedule and Contents]

The course will consist of a) lectures on major themes in Islamic studies, and, as necessary, b) seminars and c) feedback sessions.

In this semester, we deal with the following themes: bibliographic methods, Judaism, Christianity, Quran, Islamic theology, the Shiites, Sufism, and other topics.
