### Abstract :

Humans act in a specific environment using cultural references deployed through mundane activities. Even in remote areas such as deserts and rainforests, people with “indigenous” knowledge actively shape the environment. The resulting landscape reflects the history of their activities. Now, increasing numbers of international organizations, governments, non-governmental and mass media organizations, and educational groups appreciate such knowledge. Consequently, more people have been required to formulate explicit “indigenous” knowledge so that they can claim their right to the environment. Analyzing the process of forming and using such knowledge sheds light on the distinctiveness of contemporary societies, in which globalization and locality are inseparably interwoven.

All of the presenters at this seminar have examined the relationships between nature and society in Africa as cultural processes, although their stances for vitalizing “indigenous” knowledge differ considerably. The diversity of approaches promotes dialogue on the study of the relationships of knowledge, society, and power over the environment. Through such dialogue, this seminar aims to facilitate further collaboration among divergent actors working for African societies.
